WHY LEADERSHIP SKILLS MATTER EVEN MORE DURING PANDEMIC AND POST-PANDEMIC TIMES

Children and adolescents today live in a world of challenges and opportunities technologies, changing labour new markets, migration, conflict, environmental and political changes, etc. To succeed within this current and future environment, they need access to education that develops skills, knowledge, attitudes and values and enables them to become successful lifelong learners who can find and retain productive work, make wise decisions, and positively engage in their communities. By 2030, an estimated 825 million children are expected to leave school without basic level skills. Today, some 40 percent of employers globally find it difficult to recruit people with the skills they need. The ability to acquire new skills throughout life, adapt and work flexibly will be at a premium. If education in much of the world fails to keep up with these changing demands, there will be major shortages of skilled workers as well as large surpluses of workers with poor skills (The Learning Generation: Investing Education for a Changing World, ICFGEO, New York, 2016). Covid-19 aftermath have only exacerbated the problem at hand. According to UNESCO, nearly 300 million school-going children in India were affected by school closures due to the pandemic. In early January 2022, schools in some states and cities opened schools partially. Students across the country faced tremendous learning disruption due to schools opening and closing several times. UNESCO states that students lost nearly 82 weeks of regular schooling due to the pandemic. Students from the most vulnerable sections of society were hit the hardest. Children who were already living in a world of challenges further pushed have been economically, socially and emotionally. Our schools tried their best to continue schooling through remote learning on mobile phones, but the 2021 Annual Status

of Education Report (ASER) shows that only 68 percent of households with primary-school-age children in rural India owned smartphones. And of those, only a quarter of students had access to these phones; they, therefore, had no schooling for nearly two years. A majority of children have thus fallen way behind in their educational attainment. Αt Leadership, we believe that leadership skills essential for students to build resilience, grit and motivation during these uncertain times. Our programs remain particularly critical to help support crisisaffected children to cope with trauma and build resilience in the face of adversity through developing their leadership skills. According to UNICEF, these skills allow children to become agile, adaptive learners and citizens equipped to navigate personal, academic, social and economic challenges.

1 Company Overview

ENABLING LEADERSHIP FOUNDATION ("the company") was incorporated on 1st July, 2021 under Section 8 of the Companies Act, 2013 and commenced its activities on 1st July, 2021.

The primary objective of the company is To work with schools, colleges, universities and other educational institutions, corporates, non profit organizations, local panchayats, the government, local communities, and any other organization in india to enchance leadership qualities and life skills, prepare youth for gainful employment and responsible adulthood, through various modes and methods including but not limited to the use of music, lego and sports as medium and in this regard to prepare, license, sell course materials and to raise money though grants, donations and any other means for this purpose form india and outside india.

The company has received License dated 1st July, 2021 under Section 8 of the Companies Act, 2013.

The company has granted a provisional registration under Section 12A of the Income Tax Act, 1961 as a Charitable company with effect from 1st October, 2021 having a Unique Registration No:AAGCE5348CE20215.

The company has received provisional approval under Section 80G of the Income Tax Act, 1961 from the Commissioner of Income Tax (Exemptions) in respect of donations with effect form1st October, 2021 onwards having a Unique Registartion No: AAGCE5348CF20213.

2 Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared and presented on the accrual basis of accounting and comply with the Accounting Standards prescribed in the Companies (Accounting Standards) Rules, 2006 issued by the Central Government, the relevant provisions of the Companies Act, 2013, other accounting principles generally accepted in India and Companies Act, 2013, to the extent applicable. The financial statements are presented in Currency Indian Rupees.

2.1 Summary of significant accounting policies

a) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Any revision to accounting estimates is recognised prospectively in current and future periods.

i) Defined benefit obligation (DBO)

Management's estimate of the DBO is based on a number of critical underlying assumptions such as standard rates of inflation, medical cost trends, mortality, discount rate and anticipation of future salary increases. Variation in these assumptions may significantly impact the DBO amount and the annual defined benefit expenses.

ii) Useful lives of depreciable/amortizable assets

Management reviews its estimate of the useful lives of depreciable/amortizable assets at each reporting date, based on the expected utility of the assets. Uncertainties in these estimates relate to technical and economic obsolescence.

b) Fixed assets

Fixed assets are stated at the cost of acquisition less accumulated depreciation. Cost represents purchase price and includes other costs incurred in bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use. In the Current financial year fixed assets amounting to Rs. 8,14,966 has been written off

c) Depreciation and amortisation

Tangible assets other than Plant and machinery and Mould and dies

Depreciation on fixed assets is provided on a Written Down Value method. The useful life prescribed in Schedule II of the Companies Act 2013 are considered for the purpose of calculating depreciation.

d) Revenue recognition

Receipts by way of contributions, having terms and conditions attached thereto, are considered in the financial statements with respect to such terms and conditions. Thus, contributions related to future period are recognised in the period for which such contribution are made and accounted for accordingly with the balance of such contributions attributable to future periods are considered as advance under the head either non-current or current liabilities depending upon the period to be covered. All donations, voluntary and towards corpus, are accounted for on receipt basis. All expenses are accounted on accrual basis.

Interest income is recognised using the time proportion method, based on rates implicit in the transaction.

e) Employee's benefits

Short term employee benefits

All employee benefits payable/available within twelve months of rendering the service are classified as short-term employee benefits. Benefits such as salaries, wages and bonus, etc., are recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss in the period in which the employee renders the related service.

Post employment benefits

Defined contribution plans

Provident fund is a defined contribution plan. The Company expenses its contributions towards provident fund, which are deposited with the Regional Provident Fund Commissioner and are charged to the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Defined benefit plans

Gratuity is a post-employment benefit and is in the nature of a defined benefit plan. The liability recognised in the balance sheet in respect of gratuity is the present value of the defined benefit/obligation at the balance sheet date less the fair value of plan assets, together with adjustments for unrecognised actuarial gains or losses and past service costs. The defined benefit/obligation is calculated at or near the balance sheet date by an independent actuary using the projected unit credit method.

The obligation is measured at the present value of estimated future cash flows. The discount rates used for determining the present value of obligation under defined benefit plans is based on the market yields on Government securities as at the Balance Sheet date, having maturity periods approximating to the terms of related obligations.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognized immediately in the Statement of Profit and Loss.

Other long-term benefits

Benefits under the Company's leave encashment scheme constitute other long term employee benefits. The obligation in respect of leave encashment is provided on the basis of actuarial valuation carried out by an independent actuary using the Projected Unit Credit Method, which recognises each period of service as giving rise to additional unit of employee benefit entitlement and measure each unit separately to build up the final obligation.

The obligation is measured at the present value of estimated future cash flows. The discount rate used for determining the present value of obligation under defined benefit plans, is based on the market yields on Government securities as at the balance sheet date, having maturity periods approximating to the terms of related obligations.

f) Taxation

The company has license to operate under section 8 of the Companies Act,2013 and Certification of registration under Section 12 A of the Income Tax Act,1961. Accordingly, the Company is not liable to pay Income Tax under Income Tax Act,1961.

g) Earnings per share

The basic earnings per share are computed by dividing the net profit / (loss) attributable to equity shareholders for the year by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year.

Diluted earnings per share are computed using the weighted average number of equity and dilutive potential equity shares outstanding during the year, except where the results would be anti-dilutive.

h) Provisions and contingent liabilities

The Company recognises a provision when there is a present obligation as a result of a past event and it is more likely than not that there will be an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits to settle such obligation and the amount of such obligation can be reliably estimated. Provisions are not discounted to its present value, and are determined based on the management's best estimate of the amount of obligation required at the year end. These are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect current management estimates.

Contingent liabilities are disclosed in respect of possible obligations that have arisen from past events and the existence of which will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non occurrence of future events not wholly within the control of the Company. Contingent liabilities are also disclosed for present obligations in respect of which it is not probable that there will be an outflow of resources or a reliable estimate of the amount of obligation cannot be made.

When there is a possible obligation or a present obligation where the likelihood of an outflow of resources is remote, no disclosure or provision is made.

i) Segment reporting

The Company is engaged in 'not for profit operations' in relation to enhance leadership qualities and life skills enchance leadership qualities and life skills, prepare youth for gainful employment and responsible adulthood, through various modes and methods these are considered as a single business segment. Further, the Company operates within India which is considered as one geographical area. Based on guiding principles in the Accounting Standard 17 – "Segment Reporting", there is no reportable segment.

j) Cash flow statement

Cash flows are reported using indirect method, whereby excess of income over expenditure before tax is adjusted for the effects transactions of a non-cash nature and any deferrals or accruals of past or future cash receipts or payments. The cash flows from regular cash generating, financing and investing activities of the company are segregated. Cash and cash equivalents in the balance sheet comprise cash in hand, demand deposits with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

Report on the Audit of Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of M/s Enabling Leadership Foundation ("the Company"), which comprise the balance sheet as at 31st March 2022, and the statement of Income and Expenditure, and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.
